Citizens for the Preservation of St. Augustine (CPSA) voices opposition to House Bill 1037 and Senate Bill 1348

Citizens for the Preservation of St. Augustine (CPSA) hereby voice our strong opposition to House Bill 1037 and Senate Bill 1348, both titled Coordination Between Schools and Local Governments. These bills would redefine the relationship between the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind (FSDB) and the City of St. Augustine as pertaining to the purchase and development of properties by the school within city limits.

CPSA is a citizen's action group that came together to collectively address the unique issues that continue to confront the residents of historic St. Augustine. When we formed in 2003, our mission was to illuminate preservation issues within the community and to give structure to preservation activism. Since that time we have created programs to educate and inform residents and visitors and use any funds raised to support local preservation projects.

One of our most featured neighborhoods has been Nelmar Terrace, highlighting the celebrated and unique residential architecture as well as the bad community behavior on the part of FSDB. These campaigns illustrate that the struggle between FSDB and the City of St. Augustine is contentious and ongoing due to the school's lack of cooperation.

It is a great concern that FSDB might gain eminent domain and immunity from local codes with no accountability to the City of St. Augustine. Local neighborhood matter should not be legislated at the state level.

CPSA has written letters to the urge our state legislators to kill this misguided legislation. We also have a citizen's alert posted on our wesite to encourage and assist individuals in the community to voice their opinion as well.
